# READING READINESS PROGRAM

### **Kindergarten: Building a Strong Foundation for Lifelong Learning**

It has often been said that a child's overall success in school — and later in life — is directly linked to his or her success in reading. Early literacy development involves many interconnected skills: vocabulary, verbal expression, letter recognition, sentence awareness, story comprehension, storytelling, and early writing readiness. Our Advanced Kindergarten program is carefully designed to strengthen each of these foundational skills, setting the stage for confident, capable readers and learners.

Our curriculum follows a comprehensive scope and sequence of age-appropriate concepts and skills that prepare children not just to begin reading, but to thrive academically and socially.

Some of the tools we will be using in kindergarten include:

- **Abeka Letters and Sounds K5** — uses phonics exercises to help children associate pictures and words, enhance their vocabulary, develop reasoning and listening skills, and follow directions. Children will apply their understanding of one- and two-vowel words, special phonics sounds, and blends to create words, finish sentences, solve puzzles, and color pictures.
- **Heggerty** — The Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Curriculum provides 35-weeks of daily systematic phonological and phonemic awareness lessons.
- **Accelerated Christian Education (A.C.E.) PACE System** — uses individualized workbooks covering two core subjects: Math and Science.
- **Secret Stories** — a phonics program that uses memorable stories to teach kindergartners the logic behind letter sounds and reading rules, making learning faster and more intuitive.
- Children will also use **iPads and computers** to enhance their learning experience.

Kindergarten marks the beginning of your child's formal education — and our goal is to make that beginning both strong and inspiring. Our Kindergarten provides an engaging environment that challenges students, nurtures curiosity, and encourages independence, creativity, and problem-solving.



## Partnering with Parents: Preparing for Success

The early years of a child's education are a wonderful opportunity to share meaningful experiences that foster a lifelong love of learning. You can help your child prepare for the exciting adventure ahead by practicing independence and readiness skills at home.

Before Kindergarten begins, we encourage parents to work with their children on the following foundational abilities:



- Buttons
- Tying shoes
- Dressing and feeding themselves independently
- Completing bathroom routines without adult help
- Recognizing colors, shapes, and numerals (0–20)
- Counting to 20
- Recognizing uppercase and lowercase letters
- Writing their first name
- Cutting and coloring neatly within lines

These physical and visual-motor skills support the fine muscle control and visual focus needed for reading and writing success.

## Kindergarten Screening and Enrollment

For children who have not attended our preschool or for parents who would like additional insight, we offer a Kindergarten Screening each spring. This brief, standardized assessment provides helpful feedback about a child's readiness and highlights areas for continued growth. The screening is designed not to label, but to support families and teachers in ensuring every child begins Kindergarten with confidence.

Students must be 5 years old by September 1 to enroll in Kindergarten.

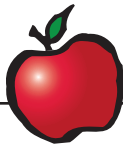

\*A 5% prepayment discount is given if annual tuition is paid in advance.

\*A 10% discount is given for the second child on regularly scheduled tuition only.

**\*Tuition is due monthly on the 25<sup>th</sup> of each month for the upcoming month. (Ex. June tuition is due on May 25<sup>th</sup>)**

\*Regular tuition is due for weeks with holidays.

\*If your child is absent, full tuition will still be charged.

\*A 3% processing fee will apply to credit card payments.

\*A 0.75% processing fee will apply to bank withdrawals.

Each student receives one week of vacation credit during the school year after four months of continuous enrollment. (Ex. if you attend two days a week, you are eligible for two days of vacation credit.) Once continuous enrollment ceases, any vacation credit accrued will be lost. Vacation credit can only be used when your child is absent. For an extended leave of absence, full tuition will be due in order to maintain your child's spot.
